

It has been a very eventful three months since my last column. With such a full plate at times I felt like a jumping bean bouncing from one task to another. I have so much news and will attempt here to highlight some of the major happenings that may be of interest to you.

**NATIONAL NEWS** - Much has been written about the new LRP and the many changes forthcoming. I urge you to stay informed by reading all information available on the nmra.org website and as published in Scale Rails. With regard to the recent election for PSR Trustee to replace Bob Sherlock who served on the NMRA Board of Trustees for 14 years, Bill Jacobs, our Order Board editor, ran unopposed and will serve approximately nine months until the Trustee position goes away on July 1, 2005. The selection process to seat the new Board of Directors that replaces the current Trustee system is now underway. I am sure Bill will have more details about the LRP implementation process after attending the midyear Board of Trustees Meeting scheduled for January 15, 2005 in Phoenix.

**PSR NEWS** - Announcement was made at the recent PSR Board of Directors meeting that Ed Hall won re-election to a second term as PSR President by a margin of almost 2-1. Congratulations! His role, too, will change under the new LRP. As PSR President, he will have the added duty to serve as a member of the NMRA Region Advisory Council. The Region Presidents serve as the "voice" of their Region on this Council. In other PSR news: at the Board Meeting it was voted to change the PSR annual convention agreement between the Host Division and the PSR with regards to the convention net proceeds. Beginning in 2006 the Host Division will receive the first 30% of the net proceeds with the remaining net proceeds to be divided 50-50 between the Host Division and the PSR. A ceiling cap for any loss to the Region was set at \$1,000. Also Bill Mergard, LA Division, has accepted to fill the vacant position of PSR Vice President.

**PSR 04 CONVENTION IN GLENDALE** - Glendale was a good convention and well organized. The weather was perfect; any dread of LA traffic was quickly dismissed as for naught and I received more comments than ever before about the outstanding clinics held. I think I saw about 27 Cajon members at the convention. Kudos and many thanks to the LA Convention team for a great time. The Cajon Division members did themselves proud to pull off another successful auction activity at a PSR Convention. We're getting quite good at this and as I keep telling everyone all this practice will only make us perfect for our own auction in 2005. <g> In truth, our success is due to the loyalty and dedication of its members that is unmatched anywhere. I think you are the best! Chuck Mitchell, Pacific Coast Region, and Bob Mitchell, Cajon Division, did a wonderful job as auctioneers. tial modeler. We need to strike when the iron is hot. When is the last time you gave your business card (or phone number) to the parent of an interested kid and offered your assistance in getting the kid going in model railroading? A few months ago I was approached by a guy that works for me who started asking a lot of questions about model railroading. He finally owned up that it wasn't for him; his 10 year old son had expressed an interest in trying it. My co-worker thought that it might be something that he could do to spend some time with his son and was feeling me out as to the potential. I loaned them a bunch of old layout design books that I had laying around to give them some ideas of what they might be able to build. I told him to get a Walther's catalog and subscribe to Model Railroading magazine. He came to me a couple of weeks ago; he needed more help. His son wanted to build a railroad with a WW II theme, but the prices for the available equipment in the catalogs were a fortune. I suggested that he contact some of the local modular groups and work on a module with his theme-much cheaper. I offered to show him some of my old modules, mostly scratch built, and explained that you can build a lot of stuff with a few tools, some scale lumber, and desire. I guess I've started my first "adoption process!" So, the next time you happen to hear a young person express interest in model railroading, even if it is only a desire to "play" with trains, don't ignore them. Talk to them. Talk to their parents. It's easy to talk to kids, just don't make the mistake to talking down to them. It isn't "cool" to be interested in learning new things, especially if they have friends around, but they really want to learn. You have the information that they need to get started. See what their limitations are and point them in the right direction. If they can barely afford the price of a car kit, then talk to them about all the neat things they can learn and do while building that car kit. You have the knowledge or know somebody that does. Pass that knowledge on. Knowledge is a lot like money. It can't do you any good once you are dead, so give it to someone who can use it for years to come!
