Please join me in welcoming two new members to the Cajon Division Board of Directors: Carl Heimberger and Morrie Fleishman. Carl has agreed to bring his experi-

enced background to our Board and will assist our Superintendent, Dennis, with matters affecting the California branch of our Division. Morrie has taken on the task of forming and managing our new Social Media page on Facebook. If you are like me, you may hardly even know what this Social Media is all about, but it is a way our younger members communicate. Morrie has agreed to educate some of us older guys on how to use this tool, maybe through some articles or maybe a clinic. See his brief article in this issue and feel free to ask him about it when you see him at an event.

As you may or may not know, there are a couple of matching funds available to the individual NMRA Divisions offered by the PSR Region and NMRA National Head-quarters for member retention activities. These funds are ear-marked for use in helping with Division expenses incurred in pursuit of membership retention and new member attraction. It is our intention at the Cajon Division to take full advantage of these offers since we spend a significant amount of our volunteer efforts toward exactly these goals. Examples from Cajon's past include our yearly Arnie's Trains open house activities, our participation in the Knott's Berry Farm Boy Scout railroading Merit badge program, our presence in several local area commercial train shows and OERM Train events. This year we are sponsoring the CIM3 Event and are subsidizing an enhanced Henderson meet hoping to gain both increased retention and to attract some new members. We have already applied for the National funds and have been approved for that money for use in Henderson. We will also be submitting an application for the PSR funds next month to help with our CIM3 Event.

What is CIM3? I was approached by Cajon member David Okamura of the California South Coast On30 modular group to consider hosting some type of modular railroad club event that would provide an additional opportunity for our local modular railroad clubs to set up their layouts and run some trains. The decreasing number of commercial train shows that come to Southern California have left several of the clubs with decreasing chances to set up their large layouts for operations. This idea fell in line with conversations that several of the Cajon BOD members had been already having and with the help of Jeff Herrmann (Cajon Membership Chair) we were able to secure a suitable building that we could afford and that could accommodate up to five modular railroads. This idea also fell in line with the need for a new location for the annual Boy Scout Railroading Merit badge program. Both of these events have come together in the heavily Cajon Division sponsored "Cajon Invitational Module Modelers Meet" (CIM3) scheduled for June 15-17, in Irvine, CA. This event is open to all NMRA members and all participating club members (+ 1 guest per member) but is not open to the public. This three-day event will feature five operating club layouts, members only swap meet, food, free parking (for advance reservations), Boy Scout Merit badge program, NMRA AP and roving Golden Spike evaluation team, etc. See the Flyer in this issue for more information.

On another track, several of our members actually enjoy getting together socially. Whether it be at a train show, someone's personal layout for an operating session or just for fun. The thought is to open these informal get-togethers to other model railroaders in our Region. The way it will work is that if a few guys are going to do some train oriented activity (show, rail-fan, layout visit, etc.) and would not mind having some like-minded company, they could put out the word via the Cajon newsletter, new Social Media page and email list to invite oth-

Model Railroading is a Social Hobby

At a recent train show at the Costa Mesa Fair Grounds I had the pleasure of meeting several gentlemen who approached the division's table and struck up a conversation. Eventually they got around to asking if I, or anyone else had any information on where they could go to get help learning how to create scenery on their layout, and how to improve their modeling techniques. They hoped that someone from the National Model Railroaders Association would be able to direct them towards some good resources. Two of the gentlemen were not NMRA members; the third was but had never attended a meet. The answer was simple, come to our next event. You will learn some new modeling skills, but more importantly, you will meet some wonderful people.

Like many of you, I received my first train set when I was one-year old, and yes it was a Lionel that went around the Christmas Tree. I would ask my dad to set it up well before we were ready to get a tree, and he always obliged. It made buying Christmas and birthday presents easy, and I still have every piece ever given to me. I became truly interested in this hobby at age 14 when my dad asked my brother and me if we'd like to have a train set up all year, not just during the holidays, and we both said "yes". That Christmas, I received an Arnold N-scale train set. After the tree came down and the Lionel was packed up for the year, out came the N-scale. I first set it up on the floor, like most kids do, and ran it until the wheels were so full of carpet fuzz that it couldn't move. The first time this happened, I took it to my dad and he said, "I guess you're going to have to learn how to work on these things". This led to my first experience at taking things apart and putting them back together. This is a necessary skill to develop because, as you know, model railroading is a tinkerers hobby. Eventually my father built my brother and me a train board, which quickly evolved into our building our own layouts. We never really helped each other, we just worked alone.

When I moved into my own apartment at eighteen I didn't take long to fill the living room with a train layout, no TV, no furni-

Time to Get Real

We are all in this hobby because we all have a love affair with trains. It does not matter if it is modern diesels, 1940's passenger service like the "Broadway Limited" or just a rickety little shay in a logging camp. And I am sure just like me, we all have a grand vision of someday having a 50 x 100-foot room with a spectacular "John Allen" layout. "Reality Check" for 99% of us-- that will never happen, so what do we have? Well maybe a spare bed room of 10 x 12 feet, the garage 20 x 20 feet or the corner planter in the back yard. With that space limitation in mind it is time to get real.

In my case just having moved three years ago, I now have a 3-car garage that I plan to use one stall for a layout that will be HOn3 with a 16 x 14-foot print. This layout is in the very early planning and construction phase. My other and more realistic opportunity was in the back yard where I have a triangle shaped planter about 18 x 18-feet that was just begging for a small garden railroad. It only had room for a small loop with a passing siding. Building it has given me many hours of enjoyment as I scratch built all the track, turnouts and bridges.

I made the decision early on that I would run "airwire", so I would never have to clean track or worry about electrical wiring. I scratch built two bridges from clear redwood that I milled to the correct timber shapes and sizes. These bridges cross over a dry stream bed I built in the garden. I was not pleased with the plastic tie look of the track and I was able to find a real deal on some used track. So, I salvaged the extremely weathered track by replacing the plastic ties with redwood ties. I also decided to not follow the rules and set my track in a mix of crushed granite and tan mortar mix. Realizing that track will expand and contract I froze a section of track and measured the length and then put it out in the sun on a 100 + day to see how much it would expand. I gaped each rail joint to allow for that expansion, again I was not concerned about electrical conductance, so these joints did not need to be tight. Construction of the railroad took about 6 months and I found working on the railroad to be relaxing and enjoyable.

So, what is my point! Even though my garden railroad is small it has given me many hours of enjoyment in building and now running it. So, it is time to stop thinking about your railroad and start building it no matter how small it is, because if you keep thinking about that mega layout you are missing out now on hours of enjoyment in this great hobby.

Once again I have had the opportunity to meet some fantastic people, many that I consider close friends, friends willing to share their love of the hobby with anyone interested. I continue to learn something new and interesting at every meet and social gathering. These conventions, meets, and festivities are the back bone of the organization and are the true value of membership.

There is a lot to do in Southern California, where every weekend is filled with potential. I'd like to invite you to please come out and join us, whenever the opportunity arises, and time allows, we'd love to meet you. You will definitely enjoy yourself, improve your model railroading skills, and meet some wonderful people that may become lifelong friends.

"Tools & Tips"

5 Second Fix- or Not?

I'm not usually much on "As seen on TV" products but my wife, Sandy, sometimes is and she bought some of this "5 Second Fix" UV curable glue on a whim. I didn't think much about it at the time but somewhere in the middle of building my latest scratch built wooden model while holding three pieces of wood together with my hands and mouth waiting for CA (Cyanoacrylate aka. Super Glue) to do something (anything?) I thought about the glue my dentist uses to secure crowns onto teeth using UV light. I have never had much luck with CA on wood and I am sure it is because the basswood and balsa wood I use have plenty of air in their surfaces and it is the absence of air that cures CA. Anyway, I decided to give this 5 second UV cure stuff a try.



A little research reveals that there are several different resin formulations and curing modes found in UV light-curing resin and they all have different cured properties. They all cure in a short time by being polymerized and cured by irradiation from an Ultraviolet light source. No way to know which type of resin this particular UV cure adhesive is but I forged ahead. What I found is that this glue works really great for holding small wooden parts together. It is easy to apply, nice and thick and comes out of a small tube end that looks similar to a ball point pen. The glue stays in place and stays pliable for some long period of time. I suppose that the UV from the Sun would hasten the cure but on my model bench it did not cure until I was good and ready and hit it with its built-in UV LED.

The glue worked really well for tacking parts together and fairly well for permanent bonding of smaller pieces of wood and plastic.

Does it have any limitations? Oh Yea.... off, it needs UV light to cure so, glue that sits between two larger pieces of plastic or metal will never "see the light" and they won't cure! I verified this. The UV light seems to penetrate thinner wood parts, maybe up to 1/16" and I had luck doing this. As seen in a lot of the on-line reviews of this material, this stuff does not do well with engineering plastics. Well,.. I am an engineer with some experience in bonding engineering plastics (Acetal, polyurethane, polyethylene, etc.) and I can tell you that short of thermal bonding, nothing works well on engineering plastics! Styrene, ABS, PVC and other plastics can be solvent bonded (essentially melted together) but short of that- good luck. This 5 second stuff works no better or worse than epoxy, CA or any other adhesive on the engineering plastics. Also, since this resin is unfilled (no mechanical fibers or fillers in the resin) it is not extremely strong.



Do I still have some on my bench? You bet! Small wood and plastic parts, fillets inside of walls, tacking parts in place until my epoxy cures and allowing for precise alinement before curing are all just what this stuff works well for.

You can find prices from \$1 to \$15 for this same stuff so be careful what you are buying. Some come bulk packed with no batteries and apparently some are old and dead on arrival. Sandy bought several for \$8 through Amazon and all have been OK. Compare the package with the photo. Also, be sure to get the cap back on straight after use because the pen will dump all of its glue into its loose cap after a few days and makes a mess. Yes, I verified this as well. Also, I would not store one of these pens for months before use. Good luck and happy gluing!
